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



MUSIC

Elementary music students have been blessed with new curriculum this year which features new music, activities, and enhancements to teach the basic elements of music. Kindergarten through third grade are working on steady beat, pitch, dynamics, and reading the music staff. Fourth and fifth graders have been working on their Christmas musical entitled The Christmas Family Tree, which highlights some of the biblical characters in Jesus' family tree, and how God used them even though they were not perfect people. The musical will be held on December 13, 2011.

DRAMA

Elementary students enjoyed several fun drama performances during the first semester. Classes were treated to visits from Bible characters as part of the high school drama costumed Bible character monologue project. Second grade students attended the play, *Treasure Island*, performed by the A.D. Players at St Luke's United Methodist. Fourth grade students enjoyed presentations from the middle school drama, A *Funny Thing Happened to Me on My Way through the Bible*, including visits from the zebras from Noah's Ark, the crew building the Tower of Babel, and "Moses."

ART

Kindergarten is learning to draw and color several different animals, using simple shapes to complete a mixed

media piece showing Noah's Ark and using those animals to fill it. First grade is working on a watercolor and crayon landscape. The landscape will contain a pasture, trees and horses. Through this, the student is being introduced to depth and shading. Second grade is working on a landscape with a sunrise and with simple 3-D buildings to continue the study of how to achieve depth in artwork. Third through fifth grades are working on their Houston Livestock and Rodeo Art Show project using photographs for reference and using grids for their preliminary drawing. Some of the pieces produced by the students, not chosen for the rodeo competition, may be entered in the ACSI Art Festival. Pieces from kindergarten, first, and second grades will also be considered for the ACSI Art Festival.

Solid FOR THE ROAD AHEAD

Dr. James Dobson notes three critical tasks that usually take place during the young teen years: the pressure to conform to a larger social group, the struggle to accept or reject instruction and values, and the formation of personal identity.

To grapple with these issues is a God-ordained function of growing up, yet there may be moments of challenge at school and home regarding these elements. In order to successfully take on the demands of adulthood, a student must begin to deal with these important developmental milestones. How can parents and teachers pave the way for

our young adolescents as they struggle with new aspects of life? How can we help them emerge from the turmoil of their youth with a solid faith, meaningful self-awareness, and strong biblical values? I would like to suggest two ways that parents and teachers can provide a solid foundation for the road ahead.

First, we must be men and women of integrity. The dictionary defines integrity as "firm adherence to a code of moral values" and "the quality of being complete or undivided." It is easy to compromise and cut corners in our personal "closets" where we think no one will ever see; however, our teenagers' watchful eyes see more than we know or imagine. Sadly many of our children have learned their parents' generation's habit of compromise and compartmentalization. Frequently there is no attempt to hide the duplicity. Mark 12:30 tells believers to love the Lord your God with all you are, have, do, and ever will be. That is consistency, wholeness, completeness... integrity. An integrated life is one where words, thoughts, and actions call out in one accord that Jesus is Lord.

Another way that we can pave the way for the next generation is to prepare them for wise decision-making. Dr. Scott Turansky and Joanne Miller in their book *Home Improvement* point out that "children outgrow rules, but they don't outgrow values." The ability to make good decisions is strongly tied to values. Too often students hear about rules, but don't understand the biblical principles behind the rules. Proverbs 3:3 instructs:

"Let love and faithfulness never leave you; bind them around your neck, write them on the tablet of your heart."

Taking time to talk about the value behind the rule provides children the wisdom they will need when they have the freedom to make their own decisions. It is crucial that our children know "the WHY" behind the rules we have created either at home or in the school environment. Biblical values formed in childhood will guide young adults to wise decision-making. Talking openly about the reasons for the rules takes practice, but it makes an impact that will outlive the rules themselves.

am honored to work each day with men and women who demonstrate a life of integrity, a lif<u>e sold-</u> out to the Lordship of Jesus. They reflect their faith as they deal with student discipline, subjects in their classrooms, and relationships with colleagues and parents. They emphasize the WHY as they speak to students about dress code, lunch room behavior, keeping a neat backpack, thoughtless remarks to a classmate, or being a good steward of the talents given from God. The middle school years are a unique challenge, but together we can see an emerging generation of warriors being honed by God.




THE STRAIGHT AND NARROW

The roads of ancient Rome were an essential part of the development of the Roman Empire. The Roman road network, nearly 50,000

The Roman road network, nearly 50,000 miles of paved road, more than today's U.S. interstate highway system, was important both in maintaining the stability of the empire and for its expansion.

The Romans became skilled at constructing roads which they called viae. The viae differed from most other smaller or rougher roads, bridle-paths, drifts, and tracks of the time. New engineering techniques were developed that ensured the roads would need limited maintenance over a long period of time. Many of the roads still exist today. The essential component of the road construction was the paving stones: a course of heavy polygonal or square paving stones called the summa crusta. The careful placing of these stones ensured the stability of the road and its capability to accommodate heavy loads over hundreds of years of use.

In a sense Cypress Christian School is laying out for its students, in partnership with its parents, a road built with the essential "summa crusta" of academic excellence and biblical values. We are paving the way for a life of godliness and righteousness. Academic excellence lays down the strong foundation of seeing God in all His creation through literature, mathematics, social studies, and science. Unlike government schools or secular private schools that teach for the acquisition of knowledge alone, Cypress Christian teaches for the acquisition of knowledge of who God is, what He has done, and what He will do. It is essentially the same knowledge that government schools teach but considered through the lens of a biblical worldview versus man's view. This biblical foundation will provide stability to accommodate the "heavy loads" that students will face throughout their lives.

Roman road construction took a directional straightness. Romans preferred to engineer solutions over obstacles rather than circumvent them. In other words, the Romans knew where they were going and took the most direct route there. They did not let anything stand in their way. They did not compromise. As a Christian school, CCS maintains a "directional straightness" as well. We know where we are going and the course that is laid out to get there. It is our "directional straightness," or steadfast adherence to biblical values, that keeps us on course, battling the influences of secular humanism and the secular culture that is constantly trying to change our course and the course of our students.

It is by laying down this course early for our students, based on academic excellence and biblical values that we hope they will, with biblical wisdom, be prepared to make the right choices when they reach the proverbial "forks in the road" throughout their lives. As it is with everyone, "small" decisions often determine the course of one's entire life. Most people don't realize that the outcome of their choices can be very great, but the consequences come all the same. They may not see it that way at the time, but looking back years later, it becomes evident that taking the wrong fork, or the godly fork, in the road has made all the difference.

As the poet Robert Frost said:

I shall be telling of this with a sigh Somewhere ages and ages hence: Two roads diverged in a wood, and I -I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference.

n this day and age, it certainly appears that the Christian road of righteousness is the road less traveled. It is not a viae, or path, easily chosen or easily traveled, especially by our students, with all the opposing messages they get from the worldly culture surrounding them. Even so, it is our hope and mission at CCS, in partnership with its parents, to pave a way for our students, who with the mercy and grace of Jesus Christ, choose with courage and wisdom the life of righteousness described in Proverbs 4: (NASB)

- 12 When you walk, your steps will not be impeded; And if you run, you will not stumble.
- 25 Let your eyes look directly ahead And let your gaze be fixed straight in front of you.
- 26 Watch the path of your feet And all your ways will be established.

COMPUTER SCIENCE COMPETITION

Saturday October 8, was the beginning of the CCS computer science competition season. CCS sent two teams to the competition – the Novice Division Team (Freshmen Joel Rawson and Todd Akin, Sophomore Mark Slattery) and the Advanced Team (Seniors Andrew Neyland and Evan McClintock). At competitions, the teams begin the day taking a written test, and then spend the next two hours writing Java code. Both teams had a great start to the season and gained valuable knowledge and experience. Mr. Kooiman, computer science teacher, commented, "I anticipate a great showing at future competitions from our CCS programmers."

EDIBLE CELLS

Mrs. Hinn's seventh grade life science classes built Edible Cells! Utilizing a large sugar cookie as the base, pairs of students showed their creativity and knowledge of the parts of a cell by adding items such as frosting, jello, gummie worms, bubble gum, Hershey Kisses, and other confections to make either a plant or animal cell from the cookie. Mrs. Hinn evaluated each cell on the inclusion of the required cell's organelles (the tiny cell parts), the relative placement of the cell parts, their understanding of each organelle's function in the cell, and the creativity shown by the students. Of course, the best part was getting to sample the candy as they worked and then enjoying the finished product!

EIGHTH GRADERS INTRODUCED TO CHEMISTRY LAB

Eighth grade physical science students were introduced to the science lab experience through a lesson entitled "It's Just a Phase." The purpose of the lab was to investigate the solid-liquid phase changes for an "unknown" organic solid. Students measured temperature versus time as the liquefied substance cooled into a solid and then measured again as the solid was reheated into a liquid.

ASL – AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE

"Undoubtedly there are all sorts of languages in the world, yet none of them is without meaning. If, then, I do not grasp the meaning of what someone is saying, I am a foreigner to the speaker, and he is a foreigner to me." 1 Corinthians 14:10-11

Language is more than words in ASL. ASL uses every part of the body and mind to communicate emotions and feelings. It is not heard, it is seen. At Cypress, ASL students are learning to see the world through deaf eyes. Our role as Christians is to spread the Word to everyone, which includes the deaf world. We are to reach the unreached nations, and according to the International Mission Board, the deaf communities around the world are some of the most unreached.

As ASL students strive to learn this new language, so also will they encounter a new way of looking at life. As Christians, this class is designed to help them understand, love, and communicate with people more effectively. Most importantly, their ultimate goal is to gain another tool to reach people with the message of Jesus Christ.

LADYBUGS

Ladybugs is a CCS organization that was started to encourage senior girls to disciple and mentor high school girls in lower grades – based on Titus 2 where the older is to encourage the younger. DRAMA

SEVENTH AND EIGHTH GRADE DRAMA. Actors presented scenes from A Funny Thing Happened to Me on My Way through the Bible to elementary students in our "theater" (the drama room). The audience enjoyed performances from "Moses," the "zebras" from Noah's Ark, and the "crew" building the Tower of Babel. Middle school drama will present their fall production in early December. ART

This type of folk art was used to decorate their homes, and in some cases, the designs became a seasonal tradition. 3) American Art – students gather pictures of Texas to create annual Rodeo Art competition held each year in Houston.

GRAPHIC DESIGN. Students are learning how to use Adobe InDesign, a professional design program. In the future, students will learn how to lay out a full page of the Houston Chronicle, make full color brochures, and design a music CD cover.



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
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
